MIDDLE PARK

(established - July 1976 – 6th & last Centenary suburb.)

Originally named by Queensland Place Names Board on 8 January 1973.

Redefined by Queensland Place Names Board on 1 November 1973.

Name and boundaries confirmed by Minister for Survey and Valuation, Urban and Regional Affairs on 11 August 1975.

Suburb name - Developer's name, accepted because the suburb is in the middle of the Centenary Estates developed area.

Middle Park is bounded to the north by the McLeod Country Golf Club, to the west by Baronga Street and Horizon Drive, Lalina Street & Macfarlane Street, to the south by Sumners Road and to the east by Estate road and Beanland Street.

Middle Park is 1.5 square kilometres in area.

Street names appear to be derived from a number of different themes – Aboriginal names, towns/places in Scotland and tree names.

Beanland Street	(Formerly <i>Estate Road</i>) – renamed Beanland Street in honour of the retired Principal of the Jamboree Heights State School – Basil Beanland – who retired in December 1979 (<i>BCC Archives</i>)
Bilga Street	Aboriginal word meaning “bee’s nest” (<i>S.E. Endacott</i>)
Bilkurra Street	Aboriginal word meaning “narrow-leaved box tree” (<i>S.E. Endacott</i>)
Bruan Close	Place name in north-west Scotland
Burwick Close	Place name in north-west Scotland

Carob Place	Botanical word - leguminous evergreen tree - botanical name (<i>Ceratonia siliqua</i>) – native to Mediterranean areas
